THE OUTLOOK.

To republicans the outlook is not what one could wish it in this judicial dist. The convention at Plum Creek put in nomination two republican candidates for the same office—district judge. It is somewhat unusual for republican conventions, or conventions of anykind to give birth to twins. We regard it as unfortunate in this instance, and hope that the party will not permit this singular freak to be again repeated.

Usually twins are just as acceptable as one at a time, but there are exceptions to all rules, and twin candidates in the same party for the same office, is one of the exceptions.

Mr. Dilworth is a weakly twin—an unnatural outgrowth that never should have seen the light. He was forced upon the convention and is the project of unwholesome causes, and an unnatural labor. It is to be regretted that the little nourishment he receives is taken from the other twin, Mr. Gaslin, who is healthy and gives promise of a successful life. Mr. Gaslin's friends did all that could be done at the convention to effect a regular nomination of ONE candidate. That they failed and that the convention divided itself into two factions and made two nominations is due solely to the fact that the Dilworth faction was composed of men determined to nominate Dilworth, regardless of the majority. They were unwilling to trust to the result of a convention composed of delegates selected by the people, and bolted before the convention began balloting, because they did not dare to face opposition in the convention, and hope, by misrepresentation out of the convention, to foist an unpopular candidate upon the party. Hence, they bolted, and hence their extreme haste to telegraph all over the state that Dilworth was nominated.

Notwithstanding the fact that the democrats have seen fit to put Mr. Hinman of North platte, in nomination, we predict that Mr. Gaslin will be elected by a large majority.

The election of Mr. Gaslin will we trust, be a lesson to those persons who have been trying to instruct the people in their choice.

The hummers, political disorganizers and bolters who largely composed Dilworth's party may be incapable of learning anything but the men who manipulated them may, perhaps, profit by the lesson.

Dilworth as a Bolter.

THE FIGURES.

With brazen effrontery, the secret political ring which puts forward Dilworth as a candidate for Judge of this district, claims that he is the nominee of the Plum Creek convention. Their claim is false, as the following figures show: There were 33 votes for the convention; 17 were necessary to a choice. When the convention assembled, it was found that the delegates from the respective counties stood as follows:

FOR GASLIN.

Sherman county, 1; Kearney, 1; Franklin, 3; Harlan, 3; Furnas, 2; Dundy, 1; Chase, 1; Gosper, 1. Total, 13.

FOR HAMER.

Buffalo county, 4.

Total votes for Gaslin and Hamer, 17; which was a majority against Dilworth. The counties of Adams (3 votes) and Red Willow (1 vote) were contested. Thus it stood at the opening of the convention, not counting the votes of the contested counties.

Before the hour arrived for the opening of the convention, Dilworth's friends had carefully figured out the situation. They found that they would, under no possible circumstances, be able to win over to their side a single Gaslin or Hamer delegate, and that Dilworth could not be nominated, even if the case of two contested counties was decided in their favor, as with the vote of Adams (3 votes) and Red Willow (1 vote) they would then be enabled to muster but 16 votes.

Unwilling to submit to the majority, they attempted to break up the convention in a row, in which they failed. They then arranged themselves upon one side of the hall, effected a sort of a side show organization, and declared Dilworth the nominee. In the mean time, the regular convention proceeded to business. A committee on credentials was appointed, the case of the contested counties was examined and decided. A ballot was taken for Judge, with the following result:

FIRST BALLOT.

Gaslin,	13
Hamer	5
Kaley	3

On motion, Mr. Gaslin was declared the unanimous nominee of the convention, having on the last vote received 21 votes.

The above is a faithful and true statement of the manner in which Hon. Wm Gaslin and C. J. Dilworth came before the people as candidates for the Judgeship. Our preference was for Hon. H. S. Kaley, but Mr. Gaslin received the nomination honestly and fairly, and we give him our cordial and earnest support. C. J. Dilworth was not the choice of the majority of that convention and we mean what we say, when we assert that unfair and dishonorable means were resorted to by Dilworth's supporters, to thwart the wishes of a majority of the delegates composing the Plum Creek Convention.
