Proclamation.

By order of County Commissioners of Franklin county, Nebraska, made this 5th day of March A. D., 1875 at an adjourned meeting of the Board of the county Commissioners of said Franklin county.

Proclamation.

Is hereby made that a Special Election will be held in and for said Franklin county. Nebraska. on Tuesday the 6th day of April 1875, at the school house in Bloomington precinct, and at the usual place of holding Elections in all the other precincts in Frank lin county, for the purpose of Electing one member of the Constitutional Convention of the State of Nebraska, and Voting on the following proposition towit.

Whereas the county of Franklin, State of Nebraska, is Seized in fee simple of fifty (50) lots in the Town of Bloomington, in said county. Now shall the said county of Franklin sell the said lots or any part thereof as the county commissioners of said county may see fit from time to time, the proceeds to be applied in erecting a building for the use of the County Officers and improving the county grounds in said town to be sold at such time or times as the county commissioners may deem to the best interests of said county-provided however that no sale shall be made under this provision after the 31st day of December A D.
