Constitutional Convention Bill.

Which became a law, provides for the calling of a Convention to, revise. alter, or amend the constitution of the State of Nebraska, said convention to be composed of 69 members, elected and paid the same as members of the legisture. The election will take place on the first Tuesday in April, and the convention shall convene on the second Tuesday in the month of May, 1875, at the representative hall in Lincoln Neb. at 3 p. m.

Of the 69 members the counties of Franklin, Phelps and Gosper are entitled to one, a fact that should not slip the minds of the people of these counties, but a deep interest should be manifested, and the best man in the embraced territory sought and chosen to represent the interests of the people.
