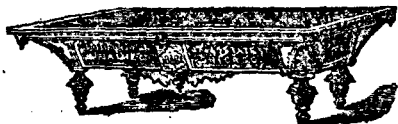

All reports go to show that the grasshoppers are not with us very extensively this year. It seems that the western counties are entirely free from them, and that there are no indications of eggs not yet hatched. We have a large number in Nemaha county, but even here they are principally found in the river precincts, or rather east of the Nemaha, though they are destroying some wheat along Long's Branch, in the south-western part of the county. Where they are found they are very abundant, and are devouring all the spring grain, and early vegetables. They make clean work of wheat and grass. If they do not remain where they now eat off the grain, but leave at once, the grain will grow again, and no special damage will be done. We are of the opinion from all reports, that we are not to be materially injured by the grasshoppers this year. We advise all to sow and plant without regard to these pests. They will damage us some, but the area of their operations promises to be limited.—Brownville Granger.

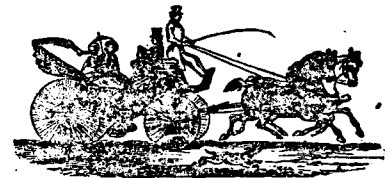
