Saturday was a busy day in town, as people from every part of the county were in, that being the day set for the Co. Convention.

Several parties were storm-stayed in Kearney most of last week.

A. W. Dowd, returned to Bloomington last week, only for a few days. He had the misfortune, while here, to have a good horse drown in Rebecca Creek. Such losses are severely felt these times.

Mr. E. W. Tinsam came home Friday night, and reports a pleasant trip. He brings news that the aid business will now take a change and the supplies come in the shape of Government supplies, based upon the enrollment by the U. S. officers, in the different counties, and each person receives supplies for thirty days in accordance with his enrollment. The main headquarters will be at Bloomington and all of the supplies will be consigned before it reaches this point, thus releasing the Co. Committee from a great deal of the heretofore gratuitous labor.

District Convention.

Capt. J. F. Zediker

Almost unanimously the choice

In the District Convention which convened at this place to-day for the purpose of placing in nomination a candidate for member of Constitutional Convention, Mr. J. F. Zediker was elected on the first formal ballot, by a two-thirds vote, of the two counties of Franklin and Phelps. Gosper county being represented by proxy only, was not admitted.

Mr. Zediker responded to the call of "Zediker," in a few brief remarks, in which he expressed his appreciation of the Convention, and assured the members that he would use his utmost endeavors to fill the mission to the best of his ability, should their nomination be confirmed by an election. Our limited time forbids further mention of Mr. Z. but we believe the people of this county and the entire district will never have occasion to regret the action of this Convention, and we hope to see them stand by the nomination at the polls. Our acquaintance with the gentleman, although limited is very favorable, and certain it is, he has manifested more than a usual degree of interest in the welfare of this county during his sojourn as Assistant Clerk of the House of Representatives, at Lincoln, the past winter, for which he now asks the people of this District to confirm the choice of their Representatives, in convention assembled, on this day. Mr. Zediker is a true Republican, and should receive the undivided vote of the entire party.

Moved and seconded that each Commissioner discontinue its own delegates. Moved and seconded that the Convention proceed to elect one delegate at large. Motion to vote for delegate at large by ballot. Moved that the chair appoint two tellers. The chair appointed J. R. McDonald and K. E. Glenn.

The following named persons were then nominated for delegates at large. W. E. Hatch, W. W. Loyd, and Ralph K. Hill. W. E. Hatch having a majority of all votes cast, was declared elected.

Moved to proceed to the election of two delegates from the first commissioner's district, which resulted in the choice of Isaac Sheppardson and S. M. Brown. Moved to reconsider the former motion to elect by ballot and elect by acclamation. Moved that R. E. Glenn and M. K. Haven be elected from the 2nd Commissioner's Dist. Moved that N. L. Whitney and W. W. Loyd be elected from the 3rd Dist.

No further business being before the Convention, motion was in order to adjourn and the Convention stood adjourned sine die.

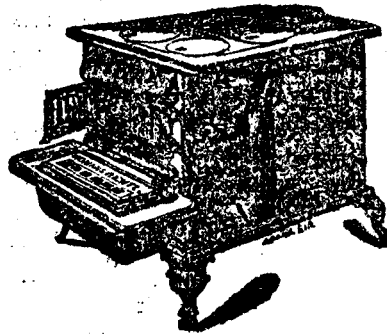
