Report of Relief Committee.

BLOOMINGTON, Neb., Nov. 21st.

To Messrs. Brown, C. C. Dake, Elias W. Tinkham, DeClercq and Rufus Phillips, Committee, Franklin County:

GENTS: I learn that some of the supplies coming from the Aid Society have not readily been applied to the purpose they were intended, and upon consultation and reflection, I think that your committees had better select one of your member of your committee to receive and receipt for all the supplies that are shipped and consigned to your county, (Franklin,) for the destitute by the Relief Aid Society. Please select one of your number that will, in your judgment, will work and act for the common interest of all the destitute sufferers of Franklin county and his mode of procedure for the present will be as follows:

To hire from the number who are destitute of subsistence, to transport the supplies from Lowell to the depot of your county, (if at Bloomington) at 40 cents per 100 pounds, and to be paid out of the supplies so hauled at the current cash price of the articles at Bloomington. In sending for the supplies, he will give an order on the committee at Lowell for the supplies and the teamster receiving them will receipt to the committee for the amount in kind that he receives, and also, the teamster will take a bill of lading of his load from the committee men at Lowell and deliver the same with his load to the general

It is hoped that our County Treasurer, Mr. Simmons will never have occasion to lock his new found treasure up in the big iron safe for safe keeping

the same with his load to the general depot of the county where it will be checked out, and see that the articles delivered correspond with the bill of of lading.

The others of the Relief Committee of the county will draw their supplies from the General Depot of the Relief Supplies, and receipt for the amount so drawn, to the committee-man in charge of the county depot of supplies. The Precinct Committee men or any committee enumerated here that are authorized to receive the supplies will take receipts from the consumers. It is desirable, if enough supplies are sent forward, not to give out a large amount at any one time—say not to exceed from five to ten days, and all at pretty near the same time. Whatever there may be left over to be economized and taken care of, in the event of supplies not coming forward regularly, and to be prepared in the event of a heavy snow time and blockade.

I most earnestly suggest and recommend that all the committee examine personally into the condition of destitute families living in each of your wards, and if possible prevent impositions, and if there are those that are so lost to all decency and humanity as to try and obtain supplies when they are in a circumstances that they can maintain themselves, thereby causing suffering to those

as we have on hand.

After requesting each committee man to
send a report to chairman the actual con-
dition of his people, so that Gen. Remick
can report on return.

PROCLAMATION.

By order of the County Commissioners of
Franklin County, Nebraska, made this
24th day of November, A. D. 1874, at a
call term of the Board of the County
Commissioners of said Franklin County:

PROCLAMATION

Is hereby made that a special Election
will be held in and for said Franklin county,
Nebraska, on Monday the 28th
day of December, 1874, at the School
House in Bloomington, in Sheridan pre-
cinct, and at the usual place of holding
elections in all the other precincts in
Franklin county, for the purpose of voting
on the following proposition, to-wit:

Shall the County of Franklin, in the State
of Nebraska, issue its bonds, principal and
interest, payable at the National Park
Bank in the City of New York, in an
amount not exceeding Thirty-two thou-
sand Dollars, (or as much thereof as will
complete the works hereinafter mention-
ed) said bonds to draw interest at the rate
of ten per cent. per annum, payable an-
nually in the City of New York, at the Na-
tional Park Bank. Said bonds to run ten
years from the 1st day of May A. D. 1875;
said bonds to be used for the construction
of a wagon bridge across the Republican
River, now under construction at Riverton
in Grant precinct, in Franklin county and
State of Nebraska; also for the construction
of a wagon bridge across said Republican
River to intersect the river from the north
on section line between sections seven and
eight, town, one range 15, west, in Frank-
lin county, State of Nebraska, and to be
built across from that point in the most
practicable way.

Also, for the construction of a wagon
bridge across said Republican River in
Franklin precinct, at a point to be designa-
ted by the legal voters of Franklin and Ma-
con precincts, in said County of Franklin,
said bridge to be built across the Republi-
can River upon a section line or laid out
road.

Also, for a wagon bridge across
Thompson Creek, in Franklin County,
at the most practicable point between

Also, for a wagon bridge across Turkey creek on the township line between town one and town two, range 16 west.

Also, plank to floor a way on bridge across Turkey Creek on the line between sections four and nine, in town one range 16 west, in said county of Franklin.

Also, to assist in the erection of a building in the town of Bloomington, the county seat of Franklin county, said building to be used for a Court House, the sum used to assist in the erection of said building not to exceed one thousand dollars.

And shall a tax of not exceeding ten mills on the dollar be annually levied and collected on the taxable property of said Franklin county, for the payment of the interest upon said bonds as it becomes due; and, after the year 1880, shall an additional tax be levied to pay said bonds when they become due, as follows:—to pay one-tenth of the principal of said bonds, in the year A. D. 1882, and two-tenths in the year A. D. 1883, and three-tenths of the principal of said bonds in the year A. D. 1884, and four-tenths of the principal of said bonds in the year A. D. 1885?

The manner of voting for said proposition shall be by ballot, printed or written, or by ballots partly printed or partly written, which shall read as follows:

“For Bonds and Tax.”

“Against Bonds and Tax.”

And the voters in Macon and Franklin precincts in said county, shall also designate upon their ballots a point for the location of the wagon bridge across the Republican River in Franklin precinct. And if after the canvass of the votes cast at said special election, it shall appear that a majority of the ballots cast are for the bonds and tax, then said proposition shall be deemed as carried; but if after said canvass it shall appear that a major of said ballots cast are against bonds and tax, the said proposition shall be deemed rejected; and, after said canvass of the ballots cast in Macon and Franklin precincts. The point receiving the greatest number of votes for the location of the wagon bridge across the Republican River in Franklin precinct in said county, shall be deemed the point at which said bridge shall be located, provided the proposition for bonds and tax shall have carried.

The polls of said election shall be opened at eight o'clock, in the morning and closed at six o'clock in the evening of said day,

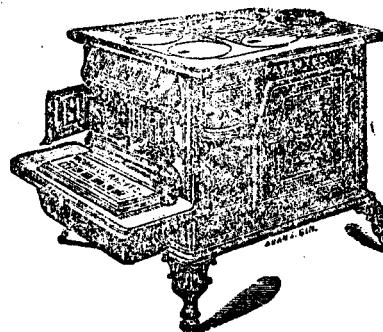
