Since the above was written, we have included some material compiled by Rev. Walter E. Reynolds, 1931

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This is an outline of the history of the First Baptist Church of Mantage, Sussex County, N.J. revised by the Rev. Geo. F. Love in 1874, and by the Rev. James Bristow in 1903, and Rev. Malter E. Reynolds in 1931.

The First Baptist Church of Mantage has a peculiar history. From all the history that can be gathered, it originated under the following circumstances.

A number of persons withdrew from the established Church of Mansfield, Connecticut about the year 1749 or 1750 and organized an independent or separate church, with the following named persons.

> William Marsh and wife Joshua Egard and wife William Southworth and wife John Slate and wife Elizabeth Lathrop Mary Nicholas Elkanah Fuller Rudolphus Fuller

As soon as they were recognized as a church, they chose William Marsh for their pastor, who was ordained at the same time, by a council, the names of whom are not found.

The following year, 1751, they agreed to emigrate to New Jersey in a body and settle at Newtown(Newton] in the northern part of Sussex County. They had not been long on their new settlement before some manifested scruples about infant baptism, as it is called, and openly declared for believers baptism.

The question now arose, whether baptism administered by an unbaptized person was valid. However, they decided the question in the affirmative.

Accordingly, Elkanah Fuller immersed William Marsh, then Marsh immersed Fuller. This was in the winter of 1752-1753, for it was remembered that the ice was in the form of a grave.

The following year, William Marsh immersed Joshua Cole, Captain Roe, Daniel Roberts, Hezekiah Smith and wife, and Rudolphus Fuller.

(Note-The name of Daniel Roberts brings to mind a letter I received this year from a Mrs. Arthur Runbeck

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Lindsborg Kansas about a Moses and Nathan Roberts who lived in the Town of Mt. Hope in 1775-causing us to wonder if they were any relation to Daniel Roberts of Wantage)

These persons were formed into a gospel church, Nov. 14, 1756, known as the Newtown Baptist Church, which name it bore for thirty four years, or until 1790, when it was changed to the First Baptist Church of Wantage, with a covenant which is said to be still extant, though the records of prior transactions are lost.

In October 1757, this Church joined the Philadelphia Association. From the records we find this to be an original church, and, in thirty four years had increased from eight to seventy six members.

In 1761, Mr. Marsh introduced the Moravian system. Thirty six persons adopted the new plan, but being chiefly poor members, the project failed in less than two years.

With this failure, and Mr. Marsh changing his manner of preaching, and turning his attention to secular pursuits, left them in 1763. The church became very small and feeble.

Mr. Marsh went to Wyoming, where he was murdered by Indians. He was born at Wrentham, Connecticut, ordained at Mansfield, Connecticut, by ministers of the Separate Order, which ordination served him when he became a Baptist.

In 1771, Nicholas Cox was called to the pastorate and ordination, who served them about 10 years.

In reference to the ordination of Elder Cox, it may be interesting to note the following piece of history. The Church at Newtown desire the Association to appoint the time and ministers to ordain Nicholas Cox. The Association reply that the appointment of both properly belong to the churches. This item would lead us to conclude, that at that date, this church had not wholly overcome the traditional notion, that conformity to the ecclesiastical usage of the denomination from which they had recently withdrawn, was an indispensable necessity, to give validity to any act of such sacred importance. It also shows the vigilance of our fathers in guarding akainst the faintest semblance of interference with church independence, in matters of this kind. During Mr. Cox's ministry many were hopefully converted and eighty four were baptized.

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The congregation becoming large, being the only one in Newton, Mantage and Hardiston(Townships) they decided to build a meeting house, which they did, on a hill between Judge Shee's and David Benjamin's, for the accomodation of that part of the church living in that vicinity, and another on the hill south of Augusta, near the graveyard, on the road leading from Augusta to Newton.

It appears from Morgan Edwards history, that the ground on which this second house stood, was given by John Stevens and 5 pound cash. His conveyance is dated October 7, 1771, congregation sixty six families, of whom seventy six persons are church members.

Mr. Gox preached alternately in the two houses of worship and lived between Hamburgh and Deckertown. It appears that the pastor's labors were much more successful in the Hamburgh than the Newton district. In those days it was common to have baptisms every month, in the Wallkill, and on the Lord's Day the people would collect in groups and take the footpaths over the hills and through valley's, each appearing before God in Zion.

In 1777 and 1778, large numbers of the church settled in wantage, when it was agreed to remove the meeting house from Hardiston to Wantage, near the site of the present building, which was eracted in 1830

Mr. Cox resigned the pastorate in 1782 and became the pastor of the Church in Great Valley, Pa., and, from thence to Kingwood (N.J.), where he continued in the pastoral. office until 1790, when, by embracing the heretical tenets of Elkanah Winchestor, he forfeited the fellowship of the Baptist Church. His apostacy is alluded to by the Association, at its annual meeting in 1790 in the following This Association lament that they have occasion language. again to call the attention of that part of Lion we represent, to another awful instance of the departure from the faith once delivered to the saints. Mr. Nicholas Cox, late a brother in the ministry, having espoused and artfully as well as strenuously endeavored to propogate, the fatal notion of the universal restoration of bad men and devils from hell; as such, we caution our churches, those of our sister associations, and Christian brethern of every denomination to beware of him.

Mr. Cox was born in Newcastle County, Delaware Mar. 24, 1742; called to the ministry and licensed in Philadelphia in 1771; ordained at Wantage April 15, 1772, by a council consisting of Elders Miller, Benedict and Sutton.

Mr. Cox was succeeded by Rev.James Finn who was ordained Apr. 23, 1783 by a council composed of Elders Runyon and Cox.

Mr. Finn resigned in 1786 and became pastor of the Baptist Church of Pittston, Luzerne County, Pa. where he devoted some seven years to the work of the ministry. After this he went to a place called Thornbottom on the Tunkhannock Greek, where a few years after he died. His descendants in that part of Pennsylvania became quite pumerous, many of whom were found walking in the footsteps of their venerable ancestor.

Silas Southworth, a member of the church, became their pastor and was ordained by Elders West and Jayne May 31, 1786.

In 1794 the pastor with brethern Humphrey Martin, John Thompson and Sylvanus Southworth were appointed delegates to the Association.

The following year, the church gave her consent and approval to brother Thomas Casad to exercise his gift in preaching, which, in January 1796, was changed to a formal license.

At a special church meeting hold April 22, 1797, the pastor was engaged to preach every Lord's Day for 60 pound per annum, to be raised by subscription, or 50 pound guaranteed, which was agreed to.

At the same meeting a number of members living in the neighborhood of /esttown(now called Unionville) desired to be set off as a separate church. This request led to the calling of an advisory council, whose decision should determine their course of action.

The churches invited to send their pastors and delegates were Narwick, Brookfield(Slate Hill), Deerpark(Mt.Hope) and Hamburg.

The council mot May 9, 1797. After prayer, Elder B. Montanye was chosen Moderator and Elder Thomas Montanya, Clerk. (Elder Montanya was from New Vernon-near Middletown, N.Y. of present days.)

The following brethern composed the council; Thomas Herden, John Sutton, Matthew Bennett and Elder Thomas Teasdale. (Page 4) Elder Southworth and Deacon Evi Adams stated to the council the object of the meeting and after hearing the reasons for and against the proposed organization, the council unanimously agreed that it would be for the Glory of God and the interest of Zion, to grant the request, and that the mother church encourage the antcrprise, signed Thomas Montanya, Clerk.

Accordingly, Lay 20,1797 the church gave a general letter of dismission to twenty three persons to form Westtown (the Second Baptist Church of Wantage as it was afterward known).

The Second Church of Wantage had been organized about 20 years before and had a membership of about 130. Its growth had been towards the North, and many of its members lived a long distance from the center or place of Worship. The field was about 18 miles long from North to South, and about one fourth of it in Minisink, Orange County, N.Y. and three fourths in Wantage.

At Beemerville, a log meeting house had been erected as a free church and was occupied by the Baptists every third Sunday. This was one of the preaching stations and the second at Meadville, about ten miles North. There a frame had been erected, with roof and siding on, but without windows, door or floor. This was occupied one third of the time.

The third preaching station was in the Elston nsighborhood near the bog meadows, at a private house. To these were added about a half dozen school houses located in different sections of the field.

From the life of Zelotes Grenell, page 36, date referred to, 1818. Meadville is understood to have been near what is now Materloo(N.W. of Unionville)Mills in Minisink. By reference to the minutes of the Sussex Baptist Association of 1860, it is on record that the Second Baptist Church of Mantage was organized in 1806, located at Beemerville, with S. Case, pastor, and J.V. Roloson, Glerk;

(Note-the writer has always understood from the oldtimers that a Baptist Church stood somewhere in the vicinity of the present Christie place just south of Unionville).

The following are the names of the constituent members.

Following this swarming out, many joined by beptism.

Nov. 4, 1798 Nathaniel Martin, William Jonnings and John Wilson were chosen Trustees to receive a deed in trust for the use of the First Baptist Church of Wantage, for the land on which their meeting house stood, said deed to be given by Joseph Sharp, Richard Edsall, Elias Ogden and Martin Ryerson.

At the beginning of the 19th century, the congregation had made the grand discovery that cold feet and a shivering body were not conducive to a devotional frame of mind, or helpful to any soul into the kingdom of Heaven.

So, on January 4, 1800 they decided to buy a stove to warm the place of worship, and at a special meeting, held at the house of Brother Humphrey Martin, it was decided to use Dr. Jatts Hymns in public worship.

This year, several members of Warwick and Wantage Churches, living at Newfoundland, N.J. sent a request that the Lord's Supper be administered to them twice a year, once by the Jarwick pastor, and once by the pastor of this church, which, so far as this church was concerned, was granted. This was followed by the pastor preaching at Newfoundland, once a month.

For some years the church meetings were very irregular, but on May 14, 1803, it was resolved that the church meet on the Saturday before the First Lord's Day in each month, and, that the communion be observed every two months. This year was marked by larger attendance at church and other meetings, and many baptisms.

1804 begins with the following note or minute.

That the church raise 100 (equal to about 2,000 today) for the support of our pastor and that the money be levied on the male members according to their ability; that it be paid quarterly in cash or grain, at the market price. N. Martin, Treasurer. Page 6

This same year a number living at Newfoundland, recuested the church to send their pastor and delegates to assist in constituting them a Gospel Church, and, to ordain Brother Ebenezer Jayne as their pastor.

At a regular church meeting held May 4, 1805, Letters of Dismission were given to Uriah Adams, Sarah Adams, Jerusha Dewitt, Mary Dewitt, Thomas Lewis, Lemuel Tingley and Enos Tingley to join the Jesttown, now changed to the Second Baptist Church of Jantage.

This Second Mantage Church by this addition, numbered eighty six members, whose pastor Elder Casad died in 1808, and was succeeded in 1811 by Elder John Wintermute, who was called into the ministry by the church. His pastorate continued six years, during which one hundred and forty seven were immersed.

Elder Zelotes Grenelle succeeded him in 1818 and was ordained in August 1819. He continued to serve the Second Wantage Church until 1822, when one hundred and twenty three members, including the pastor, were divmissed to constitute the Grange Church. It was with this new organization that the Rev. John M. Carpenter united by baptism January 9, 1825.

In November, 1833 Brother Carpenter with 85 others, withdrew from the Orange Church and formed the Mt. Salem Baptist Church

The Second Church of Mantage is now extinct.

April 4, 1807, the church resolved to spend the day in prayer and conference for mutual edification and comfort. At this time, it was customary to record the names of all who attended church meetings, and wait on all absentees by letter or messenger, to know their reason for non-attendance.

In 1808, the church agreed to give their pastor \$200 per annum.

In 1809 Elder Southworth resigned his charge and left the field, but was recalled the following year at a salary of \$125.00 per annum, the money to be raised by pew rents.

On Feb. 20, 1814, Elder Southworth departed this life; having served the church twenty seven years. During his ministry large numbers were converted and baptized, and the church enjoyed great prosperity. Meetings were largely attended, and there was a marked fidelity to church obligations and discipline. Silas Southworth was born at Mansfield, Connecticut January 20, 1751, carried in his mothers arms to New Jersey, and from there by angels to Abraham's bosom. His dust reposes in the graveyard near the church, there to rest until the resurrection morning. His name is chiseled on marble, and engraved on many a heart- his record is on high. (Note-The church at that time stood in the west end of what is now Papakating Cemetery on Route 23 east of Sussex, N.J.)

Following Elder Southworth, the church was supplied with preaching in parts, by Elders House and Teasdale.

In July, 1815, messengers were appointed to meet at Brookfield (Slate Hill) to adopt some plan for sustaining foreign missions.

November 4, 1815, the church gave Elder Levi Hall a unanimous call to become their pastor, which was accepted, and the following May he was formally installed, and received the right hand of fellowship from Deacon Evi Adams.

In July 1816, a proposition was made to build a house of worship in the village of Deckertown (now Sussex), which was voted down.

The writer has been informed that Matthew Cooper Esq. a leading Presbyterian, offered the church an eligible site on Bank street for a meeting house, which was refused (Ne are at a loss to know which writer is referred to)

In 1818, the church resolved to have a preparatory sermon before communion.

January 1819, the pastor requested several brethern to meet the church at Newfoundland for the purpose of encouraging them and strengthening the things that remained, which had a blessed influence, and led to their wish to have Elder Hall preach there once a month.

In June 1819, Brother Jonathan Sharp was chosen Deacon, and the paster was to have liberty to preach in the Beemer Meeting House once a month. (Note-No have the Beemer Meeting House tombstone records that we will list later in this volume)

For some time the subject of ordaining Deacons was discussed, but finally dropped.

In March 1820, Brother Humphrey Martin was chosen Clerk, and the church at Franklin asked the services of the pastor to administer the ordinance of baptism, and that the church would give Brother Nathan Holly, one of their members, a license to preach to them. Elder Hall died Aug. 31, 1821, and rests near his predecessor. His ministry was brief but very successful. During his pastorate the church enjoyed marked tokens of the Divine favor, and many were added to them, such as we hope are saved. The memory of the just is blessed.

In March 1822 Elder John Hagan became the pastor, and the following November a number of Brethern from Second Wantage and Brockfield (Slate Hill) invited this church to and in constituting them, what is now the Orange Church. (Nate-Le will give a sketch of the Orange Church later, written 75 years ago.)

This church installed a council Dec. 3, 1822 to ordain one of her members, Brother Nathan Holley, who was set apart to the work of the Gospel ministry by the following order of exercises.

Sermon by Elder Zelotes Grenell Charge by Elder T. Teasdale Hand of fellowship by Elder Hagan Ordaining prayer by Elder Gillette

(We have a terrific amount of data on the Holly Family which came over from New England in the early 1700's to Orange County and then over into New Jersey.)

In 1825 Elder John Hagan resigned and was succeeded by Elder Leonard Fletcher March 1826, who was installed May 11. Sormon by Elder H. Ball, and the Hand of Fellowship by Elder T. Teasdale.

The church met in August 1826 and formed a religious Tract Society, with Leonard Fletcher, President,

The church gave a formal license to Brother A.J. Baird to preach the Gospel. In 1828 Brother John Teasdale was licensed, and, the following year Thomas C. Teasdale was licensed to exercise his gift in holding forth the word of life.

John Teasdale became pastor of the Hamburg, N.J. church and was killed in a railroad disaster in the Southwest.

Thomas C, Teasdale became pastor of the Newton Church and has since been engaged in the Masters work in the South.

The winter of 1829 and 1830 was remarkable for a glorious revival. One hundred precious souls were hopefully converted and baptized into the church, many of whom continue until this day to adorn the doctrine of God, their Baviour, but some have fallen asleep.

In December 1829, the church decided to build a meeting house which was done under the direction of the following committee;

John Fost Humphrey Martin Vells Benjamin N.I. Cox David Benjamin Villiam Vilson Simeon McCoy Lewis Adams Reuben F. Randolph

A minute of January 1, 1830 says that Elder Fletcher immersed twenty eight persons in twenty minutes. At this rate the twelve Apostles could have immersed three thousand in about three hours.

Dec. 8, 1830, the church sent the pastor, with brethen Allen, Bross, Clay, Havens, McCoy, Martin and Randolph to sit in Council at Hamburgh, with a view to ordain to the work of the Gospel Ministry, Brothers John & Thomas C. Teasdale.

In December 1851, Elder Fletcher resigned, and was succeeded the following year by Elder Timothy Jackson, who came from Philadelphia, the church paying his moving expenses.

During 1832, fifty seven persons were baptized.

In March 1833, the church decided to withdraw from Warwick Association to join with others in forming the Sussex Association. The pastor, with brethern McCoy, Martin, John and James Wilson, were appointed delegates to meet at Hamburgh and draft a constitution to present to the church at the next meeting, which was accepted May 4th.

A letter was sent for the last time to the Warwick Association, which met at Orange in June 1833.

In July 1833, Brethern G. Bross, S. McCoy, J. Bross, H. Martin and James Milson were appointed to conduct district prayer and conference meetings.

Following the above appointment a committee of twelve brethern were designated to look after delinquent members and exhort them to watchfulness and duty.

February 1834, the subject of procuring a parsonage was discussed, and brethern Post and Shelley were instructed to view certain premises and report in two weeks, which was as follows;

A lot can be bought of Benjamin J. Adams for \$550, terms to be paid in three annual installments.

The church appointed Brethern S. McCoy, J. Bross, H. Allen, R. F. Randolph and Asa Wilson to raise by subscription the money, and pay the same to the Trustees, which it appears was never done

About this time a special meeting was held to pray for the outpouring of the holy spirit and the conversion of sinners, which was followed by the baptism of several persons.

In October 1835, Elder Jackson resigned his charge and was succeeded by Isaac Moore the following year.

In 1839, the church made another effort to secure a parsonage and .632. was subscribed for that purpose or object, when it was dropped.

In 1840, Elder Moore resigned. During his pastorate, which was a very successful one, nearly one hundred persons were baptized into the Church.

October 1840, Llder W. M. Fay was called to serve the church as pastor, at a salary of \$500. per annum.

In 1841, Brother John M. Ball was licensed to preach.

Elder Fay resigned in 1842. His pastorate was not very happy, owing to unfavorable reports against his moral character, which sadly interfered with the peace of the church and the prosperity of Zion. The next pastor was Rcv.Sanford Leach, who entered upon his labors in 1842, and served the church two years, when he resigned and removed to Massachusetts, afterwards labored in Hamburg, Hawley and the far Jest, where he died and rested from his toils.

Two of his sons Heman A. and Lomuel, are members of the church. Instead of the fathers shall come up the children whom thou mayest make princes in all the earth. One of the sons is now a Deacon of the church.

Following Brother Leach's pastorate there was considerable difficulty in choosing a successor. Among the ministers sought after, were J. Belcher, J. D. Hires, A. Theelock, S.S. Parker and Leonard Fletcher. All these failed.

In November 1845, the church gave a unanimous call of Rev. D. F. Twiss, who accepted, and January 7, 1847, a council was called to ordain him, with the following order of exercises;

> Sermon by Rev. John Dowling Ordaining prayer-Rev. J. B. Case Charge to the pastor by Rev. H. Ball Charge to the church by Rev. John Davis Closing prayer by Rev. Mr. Rich.

with laying on of hands by Brethern Ball, Case, Cox and Dowling. Mr. Twiss resigned in 1849 and was succeeded by Rev. Thomas Davis.

Brother Davis pastorate commenced with a blessed revival, in which many souls were converted, and a goodly number beptized.

In 1850, the church licensed Brother J. L. Barlow to preach the Gospel, who has since been a very successful pastor in the State of New York.

In 1854, Brother Davis resigned but the following year was recalled, when he returned and served the church four years longer.

During Brother Davis two terms of service, sixty four persons were baptized.

In August 1859, Rev. Joseph Belden became the pastor, and served them eighteen months, when he was followed by Gec. F. Love of Long Island, in March 1861, who served four years, during which time thirty six persons were baptized, and general presperity enjoyed. In 1865 Geo. F. Love resigned and went to Warwick, Orange County, New York where he was instrumental in gathering the New Calvary Baptist Church, and building a house of worship.

In 1865 Rev. D. T. Hill became pastor and labored four years, during which time twenty three persons were baptized. In 1869 Brother Hill resigned and went to Pawlings, New York.

After Brother Hill left, the church was supplied for some time or some months by Rev. Isaac Moore, a former pastor, whose labors were not in vain, as four persons were baptized.

In July 1870, a committee was appointed to buy a lot and build a parsonage, and through the indefatigable: labors of Brothers James F. Martin and Jacob V. Little, about \$2000 were subscribed for that purpose, when owing to a difference of opinion in reference to its location, the enterprise was abandoned.

In 1870, the church gave Rev. C. G. Gurr a call to become their pastor, which for want of a suitable house in which to live, he declined. Then a call was extended to Rev. Bec. F. Love, of Newburgh, a former pastor, which was accepted and he entered upon his duties and labors Dec. 1, 1870 and served the church three years, when he retired from the pastorate.

During his second term of service some refreshing revivals were enjoyed and ten persons baptized.

The subject of building a house of worship in the village had been discussed more or less for many years, and the best friends of the church urged and desired to see the work accomplished.

Rev. D. T. Hill offered the church an eligible site on which to build, and Asa Munson Esq. also offered a large lot for the same purpose, both of which were declined.

In March 1874 Rev. E. Jewett of Sharon, N.Y. accepted the pastorate and entered upon his labors in April.

The Wantage Church joined the Philadelphia Association in 1757 and in 1791 withdrew with the Warwick Church and united with the Yorktown, Northeastle, New Cornwall, Newburgh, Stanford, Ridgefield, Clintontown, Cross River, Frederickstown, Bedford, First Fishkill, Second New York, Brookfield (Slate Hill), Peekskill and Chemung Churches in the formation of the Warwick Association, which relation was sustained until June 1, 1833 when it withdrew with two others, Hamburg and first Newton(now Lafayette) and formed the Sussex Association which in June 1872 was changed to the North Jersey Association.

A parsonage was crected in due time, through the efforts of the committee appointed in July 1870.

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In 1877 Mr. Jewett was succeeded by new. John G. Dyer who held the pastorate for five years, during which time about fifty united with the church by baptism, and the interest begun some 10 years before by the meetings held in the halls in Deckertown grow to such extent that it was felt to be absolutely necessary that a permanent place of worship should be erected, and a subscription list was started, resulting a few years later in the commodious edifice occupied at the present time(1903), by the First Baptist Church of Wantage. Mt. Dyer resigned in 1882 and Rev. L.O. Grenelle followed with a pastorate of three years, about thirty united with the church during his labors with them.

In the year 1882-83 a new church edifice was erected in Deckertown. The cornerstone of the new church was laid Sept. 13, 1882. Meetings were held at different hours throughout the day. Mr. Adams of Unionville preached the sermon. Short addresses were made by Rev. Thomas M. Grenelle of Glenwood Baptist Church. Rev. J. M. Coleman of Presbyterian Church. The pastor Rev. L.O. Grenelle delivered a short address describing the history and growth of the church, concluding with the following words; "Christ is our cornerstone in him alone we build". The dedication of the new church took place Feb. 21, 1883 at which time the following ministers participated.

> Rev. E. A. Wood of Paterson C. J. Page of Middletown (Rev.) Rev. W. R. Keifer, Deckertown Rev. J. W. Coleman, Deckertown Rev. T. F. Chambers of the Clove Presbyterian

Soon after the dedication the services in the old Fapakating Church wase discontinued, but the building so dear to many hearts because of the associations and memories connected with it, continued to stand as a witness to the many years of constant usefulness in the service and worship of God, until the year 1900, when it was sold and taken away. The Rev. A. R. Wilson followed Mr. Grenelle, with a pastorate of two years duration. He was succeeded by the Rev. C. C. Lathrop in 1887.

During his pastorate of 10 years, seventy four united with the church, forty five of these being by baptism.

Mr. Lathrop gained the confidence and love of the whole community and when his death on Dec. 23, 1897 was announced every one felt that a good pastor, a kind friend and a loyal citizen had gone from them.

Rev. James Bristow began his labors on Easter Sunday April 10, 1898.

The longest pastorate was Rev. Silas Southworth, which was twenty nine years. The shortest, Rev. Joseph Belden, eighteen months.

Average for each about six years and nine months. Three pastors died while with the church, Rovs. Southworth, Hall and Lathrop. From the first, the relations between pastor and people have been of the most happy character. The church has taken a strong forward movement. One Hundred and Four persons have united during the five years, eighty two of these by baptism.

New lamps have been provided for the church- a new stone sidewalk alongside of church and parsonage property, complete system of steam heat in the parsonage and the new iron fence given by T. Jefferson Dunn around church grounds.

For several years the matter of remodeling the church edifice had been agitated. In May 1901, plans prepared by A. F. Lercht, Architect, N.Y. were adopted by the church but it was not until July 13, 1902, when three thousand dollars had been pledged for the work. Thus the alterations were begun.

The work was done by the day under the charge of the pastor, to whom the church gave full control. All the stone vere given by the heirs of the James F. Martin estate and Halsey Berry, and about seventy loads were hauled free of charge by the following farmers; Jacob V. Little Levi Hall Henry Havens Lemuel Dowitt Joseph Slaughter Simon Wilson Hugh McGee Theodore Harden Joseph Wilson Halsey Berry Brice Stanton

The alterations include among other things, the raising of the old building two feet six inches higher, an inclined floor, new entrances, new windows, carpets, cushions, steam heat.

The additional conveniences being a new lecture room, library, primary room, and basement.

In the memorial windows, of which there are twenty one, in all, are three in memory of former pastors, Rev. Levi Eall, 1816-1822, Rev. Sanford Leach 1842-1845, and Rev. Charles C. Lathrop 1887-1897.

Special mention might be made of the James Frazee Martin window, the Good Shepherd window in the primary room, and the magnificent Dunn Memorial, with the subject of "Jesus in the Temple with the Doctors".

The dedication scrvices are set for Wednesday, April 8, continuing through Easter Sunday, the 12th, which will be the 5th anniversary of Pastor Bristow's settlement.

This brings the church history up to 1903, just a year over 50 years ago.

We have written to see if we can get the names of the ministers down to date, if so, we will include them later.

We have in our possession, a list of the members enrolled down to 1838 copied by Mrs. Jonnie L. Meeker in 1931, we will present this next. Page 18 Under date of January 13,1955, we have the following note from Miss Beatrice F. Smith, 48 Hamburg Ave., Sussex, N.J.

Dear Mr. Coulter:

At the request of Mr. Emmet Fergerson of Sussex, N.J. I am enclosing a copy of a brief history of the First Baptist of Sussex. Our last pastor, Rev. A. G. Graham died in October 1954 after a pastorate of 18 years. He evidently came to our church in 1936. End of quote.

We thank Miss Smith for her assistance and Cousin Emmet Fergerson for his help.

We are taking the liberty of copying about a page and a half from their history published in 1931, which leaves a span of 25 years to be brought up to date when they have their 200th anniversary of the church in 1956.

Quote: Dedication services were held April 8-12,1903. Rev. Walter J. Swaffield of Jersey Gity, preached the sermon of dedication. Other Baptist ministers who participated were: Rev. James Bristow, Rev. Charles H. Rannels of Newton; Rev. Erwin Denett of Brooklyn, N.Y., Rev. S. U. Edwards of Mt. Salem, Rev. E. G. Eland of Lafayette; Rev. Samuel White of Hamburg, Rev. Thomas Grinelle of Glenwood, and Missex pastors, Rev. E. A. Hamilton, Fresbyterian, and Rev. W. A. Knox, Methodist Episcopal. In 1904, the town clock, a gift of Mr. T. J. Dunn, Was placed in the church tower. The Ladies Aid was organized in June 1906. The one hundred fiftieth Alditorsary of the church was observed Lunday November 18,1906, the pastor preaching the sermon. The name of the church was changed from the

First Baptist Church of Wantage

to the

First Baptist Church of Sussex,

March 1st, 1907. After nine years of faithful service , Er. Bristow resigned Earch 24th, 1907.

The history of our church from 1907 to the present time is in the recent past and it is not necessary that it be written in detail(what a fallacy that is). The records Page 18-A are intact and available for future reference. Rev. E. E. Loux began his labors in September 1907.

The choir loft was enlarged and a Memorial Pipe organ, the joint gift of T. J. Dunn and Martha Shelley Vandruff, was installed and dcdicated in June 1909.

After a faithful and progressive pastorate of five years, Mr. Loux closed his ministry Oct. 31st, 1912, and was cucceeded by Rov. S. W. Powell in February 1913. Evangelistic activity marked Mr. Powell's pastorate and large numbers were added to the church. He resigned in March 1916, and was followed in the percente by the Rev. Charles H. Rannels in April, 1916. After a gracious ministry of two years he resigned

After a gracious ministry of two years he resigned in February 1918. Mr. Rannels is now a resident of Sussex, and an honored member of our church.

Rev. W. V. Allen began his pastorate August 1918, and continued with the church, doing constructive work until he resigned August 28th, 1921.

Rev. Thomas 3. Davis became pastor in December 1921. After a faithful and fruitful ministry of about four years he resigned September 1925.

He was succeeded by Mev. Harry Schoener in December, 1925, who after an active and successful pastorate, closed his work Oct. 14th, 1928.

During these pastorates the Gospel was faithfully preached and many were converted and baptized. The Missionary spirit was fostered and the spiritual life of the church maintained. The financial interests of the church were administered in the interest of the kingdom of God, and improvements, renovations and repairs were made as needed. The splendid men, Pastors, Servants of God and Friends of Man, served faithfully and well. When they resigned they left a host of friends. Their work and their influence abide and they are still with us in the hearts of our people.

Since 1907 many of our members have gone to their Heavenly home.

Deacon James Cox died March 1994. He was a member 75 years and a grandson of Nicholas Cox who was pastor in 1772. (Cur Cox relatives please note, this agrees with what I saw in the Family Bible which burned but disagrees with the Cox family history as written and which I quoted.)

Deason Jacob 7. Litt le died June 3rc, 1910. He was a member 60 years. He worked and prayed for the kingdom and seldom missed a service.

Deacon _vi _illson died August 16th,1917. During his forty six years of membership he was ever alive to the interests of the church.

Deacon Owen J. Little died August 5th, 1921. He was a member sixty three years; Sunday School superintendent more than fifty years, and a faithful servant in all church activities.

Thomas Jefferson Dunn died June 11th, 1926. He found joy in living and was the benefactor of this church, the town and of other churches in the community.

Deacon George Lymock died April 23, 1929. A member for thirty six years he was ever active in the work of the church

Deacon Levi Hall died April 14th, 1931. He was a member fifty two years and a grandson of Lovi Hall who was pastor in 1816.

The name of our respected Brother, Deacon Lemuel V. Leach, a son of Rov. Sanford Leach, who was pastor in 1842, has been on our church roll longer than that of any other living member. He was baptized May 9th, 1869.

Next in length of membership is Miss Laura Berry who was baptized one month later, June 6th, 1869.

The present pastor, Rev. Walter M. Reynolds, began his ministry, February 1929. We are now transporting scholars to our Sunday School from the country districts where we once conducted school house Sunday School. With the aid of our Vreeland fund and our Superintendent, William S. McCoy. we are now using three buses for this purpose.

The relation between pastor and people is of a gratifying character and all are hopefully expectant regarding the future prosperity and development of the First Baptist Church of Sussex.

The last 25 years will have to be written when they have the 200th celebration in 1956.

This is not to be construed as a complete list of the Baptist marriages, I probably hage not accumulated 50% of them, but it does represent a start in the right direction.

This is the best that can be said for it.

I have included everything I have on the various churches which broke off and started their own congregation. I only wish I had more.

I shall give now a sketch of the Orange Baptist Church at Unionville which started with the blessing of the Deckertown or Sussex church.

Following that we shall give the marriage and Burial records of the Rev. Stephen Case which I copied long years ago from his original marriage records thru the courtesy of his grandson Supervisor Stephen Case of Greenville, N.Y. The Burial records were furnished to me by Mrs. Cole of Westtown, N.Y. who obtained them from a lady over East, what she copied them from, I don't know, but I give them as passed on to me.

The Rev. Stephen Case was a Baptist Minister of the Sussex County family, who was much beloved far and wide.
