

Coroner's Inquest.

The following is the result of the Coroner's inquest on the body of Daniel Cullin, who died at Mineral Hill on the 15th inst. The following is the evidence of Dr. J. S. Manley:

I assisted in the post mortem examination of the deceased; it revealed the fact that death ensued from pneumonia; the left lung was entirely hepatized; heart enlarged with some fatty degeneration—though he died of pneumonia; liver very much congested, the consequence of impeded circulation.

Michael Kelly, being sworn, said: He knew the deceased, Daniel Cullin, for one and a half years; saw him since his demise; is about 49 years of age, and is a native of Ireland; he died Nov. 15, 1870, at about 8 1/2 o'clock, A. M.; he was sick three or four days; sat up with him last night; he revived some this morning and asked for something to eat; the Doctor called on him and said he could not live long.

The evidence of B. W. Mansfield was as follows: Have known deceased since last July; saw him last Thursday and he said he fell off a bank, behind Russell's store, and thought he had fractured his ribs; heard yesterday that he was very sick and called to see him; he seemed to be depressed in his chest, and breathed heavily; said it hurt him to speak; I gave him the physician's prescriptions; he died this morning about 8 1/2 o'clock; Dr. Scott said his left lung was entirely destroyed, and his right lung also, except the upper part of it.

T. M. Johnson, being sworn, said: I knew the deceased; four or five days since I saw him and he seemed to be suffering from a fall, off a bank, as he stated; this is about all I know of his demise.

The following is the verdict of the jury: That the deceased, Daniel Cullin, is a native of Ireland, aged about 49 years, and that he came to his death from natural causes.

The verdict was signed by the jurymen, P. C. Hyman, Foreman, before F. J. Bartlett, Justice of the Peace and ex-officio Coroner of Mineral Hill, Nevada.

ANOTHER ARREST.—Dan Taylor arrived in Elko yesterday in charge of the officers, having been arrested in Utah as one of the parties implicated in the railroad robbery recently. The arrest was made by the same parties who caught the two previously brought to this town. The Salt Lake Herald says, Mr. Kimball and Mr. Knowlton having got scent of Taylor's whereabouts, started on the hunt, and rode over a considerable tract of country. Taylor, who had been up East Canyon, came down the canyon and stopped at the stables of Mr. Judd, at its mouth, where he grew suspicious that he was in danger of getting into trouble. Late at night he quietly decamped, taking his saddle-bags with him, but leaving his horse and saddle. The pursuit was kept up, and the next known of Taylor's whereabouts he came to the ranch of Mr. T. Booth, in a starving condition, and offered Mr. Booth \$65 to keep quiet as to his being there and to let him have some food. He thought it pretty hard lines, to be ordered to hold up his hands just as he was commencing to use them for the purpose of replenishing his empty stomach; but he was made a prisoner. Messrs. Kimball and Judd having got him in their custody, brought him to town and had him locked up. We understand he has confessed to being a participator in the robbery, and says there is still another of the gang at large, whose name he gave. His share of the plunder is evidently hidden somewhere and has not yet been found.
