Freight Received.

Another car load of salt for the Leopold company at Cornucopia was received by Frank Smith yesterday, and transferred to team immediately on its arrival.

Trains are moving the Grand Prize coal from here at the rate of five car loads per day, but we can't expect that the load train on the side-track is diminished in numbers.

Freight McCann, consisted of grand harrow, departs for a year's residence at Carson by the train this morning.

We learned last evening that a man was killed by accident on the road from Battle Mountain to Tuscarora Saturday, and buried at the latter place on the following day, but could obtain no further particulars in relation to the matter.

Off for Mountain City.

The castings for the Vance mill, for which Mr. Mayer has been waiting for several days past, arrived yesterday, and that gentleman starts for Mountain City, with the same to-day. The mill will be put in operation at once.

Tuscarora Items.

We glean the following from the Review of the 21st inst:

GRAND PRIZE. The east drift on the third level is in 100 feet, face of drift shows four feet of rich ore; west drift same level is in 105 feet, face of drift shows six feet of rich ore; east winze near the Argenta line is down 75 feet, and the bottom shows two feet of fine ore. The west drift on the second level is in 330 feet, face of drift shows some good ore; east drift on same level is in 320 feet, face shows four feet of low grade ore. The steps continue to look well and are producing 10 tons of ore per day. The new mill, twenty stamps, and the old mill, ten stamps, are running steadily.

ARGENTA. The west drift on the 100-foot level is in 170 feet, face of drift shows three feet of low grade ore; east drift from the Grand Prize shaft, second level, shows four feet of low grade ore.

GRAND CENTRAL. Work will be resumed about the 1st of August.

DE FREES. The main shaft of this mine is being widened, and when that work is completed the company intend to continue sinking. Owing to the absence of the regular superintendent, we were unable to obtain a full report of the mine this week.

BOBERT. A contract has been let to Peter Nicholson, to sink a shaft 100 feet deep, the shaft to be eight feet long and four feet wide in the clear. He commenced work yesterday. The company, under the superintendence of L. W. Greenwell, put on a force of men grading for the new hoisting works. The place selected is about 250 feet west from the old works. They are going to sink a compartment shaft, and expect to tap the ledge in about 300 feet.

WADSWORTH. This mine is situated between the Grand Central and De Frees, and is owned by Robert Hatchison, Alex. Brown and H. P. Terry. The main shaft is down 15 feet in three feet of ore which assays 150 per cent. The ledge runs east and west, and dips to the north.

One from the Falcon Mine. The shaft on the Falcon mine at Rock Creek has now reached a depth of a hundred feet, and samples of ore taken from the lead at that point are even richer than those from the fifty-foot level, where the vein was first struck in the shaft. The samples referred to are, both as to quantity and ore, headed with that taken from the Grand Eastern mine, Lander Hill, in 1875, being almost solid antimonial silver, liberally encased with ruby. It is now demonstrated that this rich ore extends from the 60-foot to the 100-foot level, and judging from the rich croppings, upwards to the surface. That it will continue on down there is every reason to believe, and that the Falcon will soon rank with the most prominent paying mines of Eastern Nevada there can no longer be a doubt.

The Alps Mining Company. The Phelps Record says the Alps Mining Company are running along well at the mill, the full battery going constantly, only five pans, however running, the balance being so much out of repair that it will take time to fix them all. The trains of the Nevada Central keep up the full supply of ore for the mill, and about the same amount of ore is being raised from the veins and shipped. The mines are all looking well, particularly the Mazon, from which good ore is being taken. The company distributed about \$5,000 to its employees last Monday, and about \$3,000 yesterday, and will distribute more on Monday next.

New Building.

J. B. Fitch's kiln of brick below town was successfully burned and some of the ones are now being laid in the walls of Dr. Meigs' new brick building adjoining his old office. Ben has several engaged in finishing the mortar, and the walls are rapidly rising towards their summit. At the present rate of procedure, the Doctor will very soon be enabled to install himself in his new quarters.

Bullion Received.

The stage from Cornucopia last evening brought down and delivered at the office of Wells, Fargo & Co. two bars of Leopard bullion valued at \$3,581.32.

It is reported that R. M. Daggett is to take the position of associate editor of the Enterprise shortly.

Freight Received.

Another car load of salt for the Leopold Company at Cornucopia was received by Frank Smith yesterday; also, a car of machinery for the De Frees mill at Tuscarora. Teams are now engaged in loading the machinery.

Another Deluge at Austin. Monday's Reville contains a graphic account of the flooding of that devoted camp on the previous evening by a visitation of sudden sluices of water from the surrounding hills. The rush of water was doubtless caused by a cloudburst in the immediate vicinity, but fortunately of not sufficient magnitude to cause any considerable damage. A vivid remembrance of the calamities of '71 very naturally caused some trepidation among the citizens, but it was soon discovered that the danger was not imminent, and the exertions of property owners prevented anything beyond nominal damage.

House Moving.

Since Frank Smith purchased J. S. Mayhugh's place on the hill, he has arranged to erect a new building on the site of the old one, and in order to make room for the purpose, the old building was yesterday moved on to a vacant lot immediately at the foot of the hill, and in front of its former position. Mr. Mayhugh proposes to erect a brick building on the lots upon which he is now temporarily residing.

Death of Mrs. E. Woodruff.

Mrs. E. Woodruff of Wells, who had been lying in a critical condition from the effects of paralysis, for some time past, died at her home in this place on Sunday. All hope of her recovery had been abandoned several days before her death; nevertheless, the announcement that she was no more was a severe shock to both relations and friends. The remains were taken to her old home in California for burial.

Bullion Received.

The stage from Tuscarora last evening delivered at the office of Wells, Fargo & Co., seven bars weighing 630 pounds of Grand Prize bullion, and valued at \$12,211.53.

The Order of Red Men has just received its new flag from the East, and yesterday, for the first time in Elko, that gorgeous bunting was proudly flung to the breeze. Its dimensions are ample, and the display of brilliant colors is unsurpassed by any emblematical bunting of any secret social society that we remember having seen. At its elevation upon the staff, the central device is not easily distinguished. Having been shown the flag before it was raised, we are prepared to give information upon the subject. The figure referred to is that of an eagle, grasping in his talons a streamer bearing the words "Freedom, Friendship and Charity." The colored bars, green, yellow, blue and red, are said to indicate the degrees embraced in the order.

A "Multitude" of Beasts and Wagons.

"It is the order of the Court that you, Sam Mills, be remanded to the custody of the Sheriff until the day of execution named in the warrant when you will be hanged by the neck until you are dead, and may God have mercy on your soul."

The prisoner gave no outward evidence of emotion, but retained an apparent indifference to his fate, throughout.
