The following article describes how Collegeport began and is illustrated with photos in our archive. Thank you to all who have contributed to this effort.

### THE EARLY HISTORY OF COLLEGEPORT

compiled by G. W. Franzen

The Town of Collegeport was established on May 25, 1908 by the Burton D. Hurd Land Company as part of a land development scheme to colonize the Texas Gulf Coast area. The grand Hotel Collegeport overlooking the Tres-Palacios Bay and the fashionable "pagoda" pavilion were built to accommodate and entertain excursion parties brought in by Hurd.




**Grand Opening of Collegeport--1909**

The Hurd Land office was next door to the hotel, making it convenient for guests and agents to meet. The people who visited on these promotional tours became known as "Homeseekers." Hurd reached out to these prospective buyers by placing ads in newspapers in midwestern states, offering special excursion rates to anyone willing to make the trek to the Texas Gulf Coast.



In planning the new town, Hurd and William H. Travis negotiated a site for the Gulf Coast University of Industrial Arts, of which Travis became President. Students enrolling could have tuition and housing in exchange for labor, making an education possible at little cost—the men worked on the school farms and orchards and the women in domestic service in the laundry or bakery. These services were offered to residents in the community.

The homeseekers who bought land with the intention of settling here soon returned with their families and possessions by rail. My grandparents, Gust and Ellen Franzen sold out in lowa and brought only essentials and clothing with them to Texas. Gust first came to Texas with Hurd's Excursion of August 20, 1909. This is when he purchased farmland south of Collegeport. He returned to lowa and arranged an auction to liquidate his livestock and equipment before returning to Collegeport with his wife, Ellen and children Dorothy and Arnold. Their auction was held December 10, 1909 and they arrived by train here on Christmas eve, and spent their first night in the Hotel Collegeport.

Hurd's agents had represented mild winters and year-round growing conditions, so they left their warm clothing and blankets behind—and nearly froze to death their first winter in Texas. However, all who came had dreams of success.

A variety of houses, farmsteads and business sprang up quickly, and the town flourished.

Along with the burgeoning number of homes and businesses, churches were organized and religious services abounded in the community. The First Church of Collegeport—Federated was organized in 1909--its membership represented 14 denominations. Grace Chapel of St. Mary's Mission was organized in 1910 by the Episcopalians in the community. The Federated Church affiliated with the Presbyterian Church in 1922, and the Episcopal Church disbanded due to declining membership about the same time. The building was moved to Palacios in 1926 and consecrated as St. John's Episcopal Church in 1927.

Education was a priority for the settlers. A school was organized and first classes were held under a tent. Upon completion of the Federated Church building, its south wing served as the school until the red brick school building was completed.

For a while the town of Collegeport thrived, but the prosperity was short lived due to a series of circumstances beyond anyone's control. By 1915 the university closed, and many disillusioned settlers sold farms and businesses and returned from whence they came. Others remained and found ways to make the land productive with other crops.

Pictured on the next page is a copy of the Collegeport Business Directory published in its heyday (ca. 1914) listing many of the business in the town. In the center portion is the Collegeport Telephone Directory.

Collegeport Day is the annual celebration of the founding of the town on May 25, 1908. It has been observed by residents and friends of the community each year since, and is now celebrated the Last Saturday of May.
