Precious Memories

Frank Braggs, Jr., was born to Mr. and Mrs. Frank Braggs, Sr., on August 4, 1943 in Abilene, Texas. Both parents preceded him in death.

At the age of six weeks Frank was raised by his Aunt, Mrs. Lenora Jenkins, the only mother he knew who raised him along with three children, Willie Jenkins, Jr., Ruth Audrey Anderson, and Adell Farley. Mother and one sister (Ruth) precede him in death. He joined church at an early age and was a member of Rose Hill Baptist Church, Groveton.

He attended Groveton Colored High I chool and after graduating from George Washington Carver High I chool in the year of 1963, he enlisted in the United States Army. Where he was a military police for eight years and held two Bronze Stars and two Purple Hearts for his service in Korea and Vietnam.

Mr. Braggs joined the Trinity County Sheriff's Department in the year of 1971, and worked under the late Sheriff Lynn Evans as a Deputy Sheriff for three years. On May 11, 1973 he graduated from East Texas Police Academy at Kilgore College.

From 1974 to 1976 he served as Chief of Police in Diboll. And from 1976 to 1977 he served as Chief of Police in Groveton. After leaving the police department he went back to the sheriff's department and worked under Mr. Evans until he preceded him in death. He also worked under the leadership of Sheriff Kenneth Moore and Brent Phillips until the Lord called him home. Frank Braggs was the only black officer for the Trinity County Sheriff's Department.

He leaves to mourn sister, Mrs. Adell Farley of Groveton; brother, Mr. Willie Jenkins, Jr., of San Francisco, Calif.; sons, Kevin Braggs of San Antonio, Rodney Thomas of Houston, and Michael of San Antonio; daughters, Ronda of Kansas City, and Lakendra Braggs of Houston; four grandchildren; uncle, Mr. Joe Bennett of Groveton; and a host of nieces, nephews, other relatives and friends.
