Obituary



Lula Mae O'Neil Hicks was the sixth of seven children born to William and Andie O'Neil in Fodice, Texas on November 16, 1908. She entered eternal rest on Wednesday, February 16, 1994.

"Mae," as she was affectionately called, was the product of a home environment that symbolized Christian love and a zeal for educational excellence. She was christened at infancy in the White Rock Methodist Church and maintained an active affiliation in the Methodist Church throughout her lifetime. She held membership in Mallalieu Methodist Church and was a pioneer member of Union Memorial United Methodist Church until her death. Her most valued talent, an alto voice, was joyously shared at each church and she also served as announcing clerk at each church.


Mrs. Hicks attended elementary school in Fodice, Texas and completed her high school education at Wiley College Laboratory School. She pursued her higher education at Mary Allen College in Crockett, Texas; Prairie View A & M College, and Houston College for Negroes. She received a Masters Degree in Education from Texas Southern University.

"Mae" spent most of her life teaching and guiding young people to fuller and richer lives. Her influential motivation inspired many young people to reach for educational excellence. Forty years were dedicated to the teaching profession in the following public schools of Texas: Woodlake, Texas; Lovelady, Texas; Ritters Lake Community and Groveton, Texas. "Mae" so loved educating children that fifteen years of substitute post-retirement teaching were rendered to the Houston Independent School District.



She was preceded in death by her husband, William Hicks; sisters Marjorie Hadnott, Beulah Taylor, La Verne Wooten; brothers Melvin, Franzie and William Norman O'Neil.

Left to treasure her precious memory are: a daughter, Velma Livingston Bigsby and husband Edwin Maurice; a son, Newman Livingston and wife Joyce; a sister, Focella Davis of Oakland, California; four grandchildren, Kathy Sue Bigsby Brooks and husband Richard, Reginald Alan Livingston, Edwin Maurice Bigsby, Jr., Sandra Michelle Livingston; many nieces and nephews, as well as other relatives and friends.






